Extends the life of the Medicare program by 5 years	✓	NO – Republicans protect the insurance industry at the expense of beneficiaries and taxpayers
Decreases the rate of growth in Medicare spending by 3 percentage points during the next 20 years, from 7 percent average growth rate to 4 percent	✓	NO – Republicans would continue Medicare on its currently unsustainable rate of growth
Provides incentives payments to physicians practicing in the most cost efficient areas of the country	✓	NO
Eliminates government overpayments to private insurance companies in Medicare	✓	NO – Republicans cater to the private insurance industry by continuing to pad their profits with massive overpayments that drain the Medicare trust fund and raise premiums for all beneficiaries
Limits cost sharing in Medicare Advantage to no more than cost sharing in traditional Medicare	✓	NO – Republicans allow private MA plans to charge high cost sharing for certain services that sicker enrollees use, like cancer drugs
Allows Medicare Advantage enrollees to switch plans or enroll in traditional Medicare if their plan is violating program rules	✓	NO – Republicans continue to give MA enrollees few options to leave their plan even if it violates Medicare rules
Requires disclosure of Medicare Advantage plan administrative costs	✓	NO – Republicans continue to keep Medicare beneficiaries in the dark about how much their MA plan spends on medical care versus admin costs and profits
Extends Medicare Advantage special needs plans	✓	NO – Republicans let this program expire at the end of 2010
Eliminates the Part D “donut hole”	✓	NO – Republicans do nothing to address this critical flaw resulting from their budget gimmick in 2003
Gives Medicare beneficiaries a 50 percent discount on Part D drugs in the coverage gap until it is eliminated	✓	NO – Republicans do nothing to address this critical flaw resulting from their budget gimmick in 2003
Prohibits Part D plans from changing their formulary mid-year	✓	NO – Republicans continue to allow Part D plans to increase cost sharing or drop drugs in the middle of a plan year
Eliminates wasted prescription drugs in long-term care facilities	✓	NO – Republicans continue to pay for prescription drugs that are not used by patients and are just thrown away

Clarifies that Part D plans can offer generic drugs for free to enrollees		NO – Republicans do not provide any incentives to use lower-cost generic drugs
Protects Medicare beneficiaries in rural areas		NO – Republicans let all of the provisions protecting rural Medicare beneficiaries' access to health expire
Improves and simplifies access to financial assistance for low-income Medicare beneficiaries		NO – Republicans continue to let seniors with nest eggs be ineligible for Part D low-income subsidies, and keep in place all other barriers that prevent seniors from accessing benefits that they are entitled to
Permanently covers immunosuppressive drugs for kidney transplant patients		NO – Republicans continue the penny-wise, pound-foolish policy of only paying for these needed drugs temporarily, but then paying for another transplant when the patient can't afford the drugs on their own
Provides reimbursement to physicians if patients seek and consent to talking about end-of-life care		NO – Republicans continue to short-change physicians for conversations that patients want to have with them
Makes available payment incentives for primary care services		NO – Republicans make no investments in encouraging primary care in Medicare
Eliminates cost sharing for all preventive services		NO – Republicans would continue to require cost sharing for preventive services in Medicare, like colonoscopies
Reimburses federally qualified health centers for preventive services		NO – Republicans continue to limit reimbursement for Medicare-covered preventive services provided in community health centers, like mammograms
Establishes nursing home transparency and protections for patients in nursing homes		NO – Republicans fail to address concerns about nursing home accountability
Requires sunshine on pharmaceutical and device manufacturer payments to doctors		NO – Republicans continue to prevent consumers from knowing the financial relationships between providers and pharmaceutical and device manufacturers
Requires reporting of healthcare-associated infections in hospitals and ambulatory surgical centers		NO – Republicans fail to address this important issue
Distributes unused medical residency slots to primary care positions to expand the primary care workforce		NO – Republicans continue to allow these unused slots to be wasted, rather than distribute them to where they are needed to help address the primary care physician shortage

Encourages hospitals and post-acute providers to reduce preventable hospital readmissions		NO – Republicans continue to pay full price for poor quality care and unnecessary re-hospitalizations
Increases penalties for providers who submit false information on claims for payment		NO – Republicans fail to adequately crack down on waste, fraud and abuse
Imposes penalties for private Medicare plans that violate marketing requirements, submit false information on their bids or rebate reports		NO – Republicans continue to protect private plans that engage in abusive marketing practices or submit false information to the government for payment
Narrows the window of time for submission of provider claims for payment, and requires electronic payments to be made to FDIC institutions to eliminate “gaming” of payment policies		NO – Republicans do not attempt to crack down on false claims
Requires providers and suppliers to adopt compliance programs as a condition of participating in Medicare and Medicaid		NO – Republicans continue to make it optional for providers and suppliers to participate in compliance programs, letting bad actors slip through the cracks
